which we were privileged to be part of—we observed firsthand the awesome, miracle-working power of God on an almost daily basis. The Bible proclaims and our personal experience bears out that God *wants* to work miracles on behalf of His children, and it probably puzzles Him that more of us aren't asking Him to act in miraculous ways on our behalf.

Jesus thought nothing of asking God for a miracle. After all, He was with God and He was God when the walls of Jericho crumbled, when the Red Sea parted, when the sun stood still, when Jonah survived three days in the belly of the great fish. He knew from experience that His Father is all powerful and that the Father's power is His also.

Amazingly, the Old Testament saints, who did not have the example of Jesus to follow, were also bold in asking for miracles. Elijah prophesied an unending supply of meal and oil to feed himself and the household of the widow who took him in in the city of Zarephath. Later, he even raised her son from the dead. Elijah's servant Elisha had a gift of healing and cleansed Naaman the leper. The New Testament, of course, is full of miracles, as the followers of Jesus learned to rely upon the power of the Holy Spirit. So why now, when there are more Christians on the face of the earth than at any other time in history, have so

many Christians become reluctant to ask and believe for a miracle?
