All Have Sinned

The Bible clearly states that all have sinned. That includes you, along with

every man, woman, boy, and girl who has ever lived.

"For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God." (Rom. 3:23)

"If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us." (1 John 1:8)

We are each guilty of sin and rebellion against God's laws. That means we are liable for every transgression and wrongdoing, for all have sinned. When we sin against God and break His moral law, we are responsible and held eternally accountable.

No good deed or virtuous action can remove sin or change the condition of man's heart. The one and only way we can escape eternal judgment for our sins and transgressions is to be born again as we repent of sin.

The Penalty For Sin

God's Loving Plan
